A Litany Of Faith

by Rev. Dr. Ianther Mills (2024)

Pastor: By faith... this worshipping community has served at the corner of 11th & K Streets for 188 years.

Voice#1: By faith... in 1836, a group of 75 Black men and women led by Eli Nugent left Foundry Methodist Episcopal Church to form their own congregation to worship freely.

Voice#2: By faith... the people borrowed \$300 and built the first church, a small, white frame structure.

Voice#3: By faith... Asbury Chapel was organized.

SUNG RESPONSE: We've come this far by faith; Leaning on the Lord.

Child: By faith... in 1837, a public school was opened in Asbury Chapel for Black children.

Youth: By faith... in 1848, teenaged members Mary and Emily Edmonson tried to flee slavery on the ship *Pearl*.

Veteran: By faith... in 1863, a meeting was held at Asbury Chapel for the organization of a "Colored" Regiment in the District of Columbia.

Pastor: By faith... in 1864, with the founding of the Washington Annual Conference, Asbury's role and leadership as a Black congregation were firmly established with the appointment of its first Black pastor, Reverend James Peck.

Voice#1: By faith... in 1945, the people of Asbury established Asbury Federal Credit Union, increasing access to financial resources for Black people.

Voice#2: By faith... in 1947, the people of Asbury established the first integrated apartment building in the District of Columbia.

Voice#3: By faith... in 1963, the people of Asbury joined the March on Washington and provided shelter for many of the thousands who participated.

SUNG RESPONSE: Trusting in his holy Word; He's never failed us yet.

Voice#1: By faith... in 1978, the people of Asbury established Asbury Dwellings to provide affordable senior housing.

Voice#2: By faith... the people of Asbury remained steadfast and vigilant prophetic witnesses when the Proud Boys tore down and burned our Black Lives Matter banner.

Voice#3: By faith... the people of Asbury are still leaders in social justice through its ministries of outreach: the Neighbor-to-Neighbor Breakfast, Sunday Outreach, Food Pantry, Dinner Church, and Social Justice Ministry; and its support of Angel Tree, Children's Playtime Project, Project Transformation, TraRon Center, Thomson Elementary School, and Black Lives Matter.

ALL: Today, we, the people of Asbury United Methodist Church, are still committed to loving, serving, and transforming lives **by faith**!

SUNG RESPONSE: Oh, oh, can't turn around. We've come this far by faith.





BARRYCLAYTONBLACK
Ph.D., D.Min., D.D., L.H.D., D.P.S., LL.D.

On June 27, 2003, Rear Admiral Upper Barry C. Black (Ret.) was elected the 62nd Chaplain of the Senate. He started his work on July 7, 2003. Prior to Capitol Hill, Chaplain Black served in the U.S. Navy for over twenty-seven years, ending his distinguished career as the Chief of Navy Chaplains. The Senate elected its first chaplain in 1789.

U.S. SENATE

In addition to opening the Senate each day in prayer, Chaplain Black provides counseling and spiritual care for Senators, their families, and staff – a combined constituency of over seven thousand people. He also meets with Senators about spiritual and moral issues, assists with research on theological and biblical questions, and facilitates discussion and reflection small groups among Senators and staff. He also conducts marriage enrichment counseling and officiates at weddings, funerals, and memorial services. Chaplain Black initiates and participates in special and seasonal observances, leads interdenominational prayer gatherings, and cultivates relationships with local clergy and leaders of humanitarian agencies.

In order to stay informed of the needs of the Senate community, Chaplain Black maintains a program with a volunteer liaison in each office to assist him. A member of his staff directs this program. "I see my role as the chaplain to be a confidential counselor, spiritual advisor, scripture teacher, intercessor, and friend to the Senators, their spouses, and the Senate staff as they seek to discover and live God's wonderful plan."

The Office of the Chaplain is nonpartisan, nonpolitical, and nonsectarian.

U.S. NAVY

Commissioned as a Navy Chaplain in 1976, Chaplain Black's first duty station was the Fleet Religious Support Activity in Norfolk, Virginia. Subsequent assignments include Naval Support Activity, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland; First Marine Aircraft Wing, Okinawa, Japan; Naval Training Center, San Diego, California; USS BELLEAU WOOD (LHA 3) Long Beach, California; Naval Chaplains School Advanced Course, Newport, Rhode Island; Marine Aircraft Group THIRTY-ONE, Beaufort, South Carolina; Assistant Staff Chaplain, Chief of Naval Education and Training, Pensacola, Florida; and Fleet Chaplain, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, Norfolk, Virginia.

As Rear Admiral, his personal decorations included the Navy Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal (two medals), Meritorious Service Medals (two awards), Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medals (two awards), and numerous unit awards, campaign, and service medals.

PERSONAL INFORMATION

Chaplain Black is a native of Baltimore, Maryland and an alumnus of Oakwood University, Andrews University, North Carolina Central University, Palmer Theological Seminary, Salve Regina University, and Alliant International University. In addition to earning Master of Arts degrees in Divinity, Counseling, and Management, he has received a Doctorate degree in Ministry and a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Psychology. Chaplain Black has been selected for many outstanding achievements. Of particular note, he was chosen from 127 nominees for the 1995 NAACP Renowned Service Award for his contribution to equal opportunity and civil rights. He received the 2002 Benjamin Elijah Mays Distinguished Leadership Award from The Morehouse School of Religion. In 2004, the Old Dominion University chapter of the NAACP conferred on him the Image Award, "Reaffirming the Dream – Realizing the Vision" for military excellence. In May 2019, Chaplain Black was awarded Becket's highest honor, The Canterbury Medal, for his worthy defense of religious liberty for people of all faiths. He also received the 2022 Northern Lights Book Award in the Religious/Spiritual category for his children's book: A Prayer for Our Country.

He has authored six books beginning with his autobiography, From the Hood to the Hill (2006), The Blessing of Adversity (2011), Nothing to Fear (2017), Make Your Voice Heard in Heaven (2018), Bible Wisdom for Better Living (2019), and A Prayer for Our Country: Words to Unite and Inspire Hope (2022).

Chaplain Barry C. Black is married to the former Brenda Pearsall of St. Petersburg, Florida. They have three sons: Barry II, Brendan, and Bradford.

Scripture of the Month: Book of James

Thought for the Month: Change your church culture. Create an outwardly focused environment where hospitality and invitation happen Sunday and every day of the week. This book offers five steps to help congregations go public with their faith—from service projects to sharing the faith with persons who want to know more about Christ and the church. This book offers tactics to increase individual and church competency with relational evangelism with friends, neighbors, and even strangers. Learn how to start up a conversation, follow up with contacts, and navigate unfamiliar settings. Learn what works and what doesn't.

We may think that just because we invite someone on our church property, they'll come back. Often we don't reach out to help people cross the faith line, because we're uncomfortable with "evangelism" or just plain scared. Gain the confidence to share the good news boldly. After all, we know the name of the One who loves us all and who holds all power over heaven and earth.



During the State of the Church meeting in June, Asbury's financial team shared that the 2024 monthly budget giving target is \$94,229 (see the solid line in the graph below). 



Share your gifts, talents, and skills. Make a difference in our church, community, and world. Nominations are now being received for lay leadership terms completed at the end of the year. To indicate your interest, complete the Nominations Interest Form by September 20, 2024. Interest forms will be reviewed and considered by the Nominations and Leadership Development Committee. Nominations will follow and be confirmed by church vote at the annual Church Conference held in October. Orientation and training will be provided to all new leaders. Terms begin January 1, 2025.

LEADERSHIP DESCRIPTIONS:

- Church Council Provides for planning and implementing a program of nurture, outreach, witness, and resources so that Asbury fulfills its mission of loving, serving, and transforming lives; is the administrative agency of the Charge Conference. 3-year term. Meets monthly, usually via ZOOM.
- Lay Leader— Works with the Senior Pastor to fulfill the mission and vision of the congregation. Serves as a member of the Church Council, SPRC, Finance Committee, and Nominations and Leadership Development. 3-year term.
- Lay Members to the Annual Conference Serve as liaisons between the church and Annual Conference sessions; report to the church the action of the Conference. 3-year term. Must attend Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference sessions the first week of June.
- **Board of Trustees** Oversees use and care of all church property, including buildings, grounds, and equipment. 3-year term. Meets monthly, usually via ZOOM.
- Staff/Parish Relations Committee Confers with Clergy and Staff on matters related to effective ministry and relationships with congregation; oversees employment policies and procedures. 3-year term. Meets monthly, usually via ZOOM but also in-person at the church.
- Nominations and Leadership Development Committee Recruits, recommends to the Charge Conference, nurtures, and supports lay leadership. 3-year term. Meets three to four times in fall as called by the Senior Pastor, usually via ZOOM.
- Committee on Finance Establishes and oversees financial policies, including disbursement of contributions. Responsible for developing and implementing plans to raise sufficient income to meet the budget adopted by Church Council. 3-year term. Meets monthly, usually via ZOOM.
- **Stewardship Committee** Works as a subcommittee of the Committee on Finance to execute an annual program of stewardship. 3-year term. Meets as called, Fall and Spring, usually via ZOOM.
- Faith Formation (Education)Team Plans and implements a program of Christian formation and educational experiences, including the church school, short-term and long-term bible study, small groups, and age-level ministries. 3-year term. Meets as called, at least quarterly.
- Missions and Social Justice Team Plans and implements a program of missional outreach, justice, and advocacy. This includes local, national, and international missions; health and welfare; and church and societal issues such as homelessness, food insecurity, racial justice, and rights of all people. 3-year term. Meets as called, at least quarterly.
