Asbury United Methodist Church Health Ministry Newsletter January 2025 By Drs. Ealena Callender and Clive Callender Preparing for Medical Emergencies at Home

Medical emergencies can happen at any time but become more frequent as we age. Preparation is key to handling such situations and will enhance safety and peace of mind for you and your loved ones.

Essential steps to prepare for medical emergencies

- 1. Create an emergency plan. This plan should outline specific actions to take in various scenarios, such as a fall or sudden illness. Everyone in the household and members of your support system should understand this plan to ensure that everyone knows their roles and can respond quickly and efficiently during an emergency.
- 2. Identify emergency contacts; local, trusted adults who can advocate for you in an emergency. These individuals should be willing and able to accompany you to the hospital if you need emergency care.
- 3. Ensure individuals in your support system clearly understand basic first aid. Knowledge of CPR, wound care, and how to assist someone choking can be lifesaving. Consider enrolling in a first aid course to equip caregivers and family members with the confidence and competence needed in emergencies. The American Red Cross has training courses that teach you how to administer CPR and train you to use the Automated External Defibrillator (AED). Both of these are lifesaving measures that anyone can learn and apply.
- 4. Make sure you have working smoke detectors and operational fire extinguishers located throughout your home.
- 5. Keep emergency medical information updated and easy to find: You should post up-to-date information where emergency medical personnel can find it on the refrigerator and in the wallet. Make sure your emergency contact has this list. Your list should include the following important medical information:
 - a. Medical history
 - b. Medication list
 - c. Allergies
 - d. Contact information for doctors and pharmacists
 - e. Emergency contacts information
 - f. Blood type
 - g. Organ donor preferences
 - h. Agents under health care power of attorney (this is someone who is designated to make decisions for you if you become incapacitated)
 - i. Advanced medical directives (In a life-threatening medical emergency, advanced medical directives tell healthcare providers what treatments you would or would not want)
 - j. HIPAA release forms (tells health care providers who they have permission to share health care information with)
 - k. Insurance information
- 6. If you have a serious allergy or medical condition, talk to your doctor about whether you should have a medical alert ID bracelet or necklace.
- 7. Make sure your home is clearly marked outside so emergency responders can easily find it. The address should be posted prominently on the mailbox and on the home itself. Use large numbers that are reflective or illuminated so they can be seen day and night.
- 8. Ensure emergency responders can get access to your home. Consider installing a lockbox that can be accessed by emergency personnel.
- 9. Get a personal emergency response system. These can help prevent life-threatening injuries from falls and other health emergencies by quickly connecting you to a monitoring center with the press of a button.

Key features of medical alert systems:

- 1. Research shows that using a medical alert system can help seniors remain in their homes for longer, boost confidence in their ability to complete everyday tasks, and reduce anxiety about falling.
- 2. Most medical alert systems feature a base unit with a help button and a two-way speaker. The unit is paired with a wearable pendant or bracelet. In an emergency, the user presses the help button on the base station or pendant. Pressing the button will call a live operator, who can send first responders or whatever help is needed. If you're incapacitated and the operator can't contact you, they'll send help right away.
- 3. Professional monitoring: All of the best medical alert systems offer 24/7 professional monitoring from a staffed response center.
- 4. Water-resistant equipment: Water-resistant equipment allows users to wear the device in the shower or bath, where falls often happen.
- 5. Coverage range: The coverage range refers to how far away your base unit can be from your wearable help button and still connect. Coverage typically ranges from 400 to 1,400 feet, depending on the system.
- 6. Automatic fall detection: Most medical alert providers offer automatic fall detection pendants, which you wear instead of a normal help button. These pendants automatically detect the motion of a fall and call for help, even if you can't press your button.
- 7. Mobile apps: Many systems offer a companion mobile app that loved ones and caregivers can use to track the system's location, battery level, and emergency call history.
- 8. Health and wellness features: Some systems have health and wellness features like step tracking and daily step goals. This can help users stay active as they age. Caregivers can also monitor activity and look for any abnormal patterns that could indicate a health issue.
- 9. GPS tracking: GPS tracking allows first responders to quickly locate the user during an emergency. If the system has a mobile app, GPS technology allows someone to check the device's location.
- 10. Lockboxes: A lockbox is a small, secure container that holds keys to your house. Usually kept on or near the front door, this device will allow emergency personnel to enter your home if you cannot come to the door. Some medical alert providers offer lockboxes for free, while others charge a one-time or monthly fee. The company's monitoring center will send the lockbox code to first responders during an emergency. That way, they can use the key in the lockbox to easily access your home so they don't have to break down the door.


